WHAT WILL BE COVERED?

A quick review of RtI structure and main components will be covered to include tiers, components, and problem-solving vs. standard protocol. A new approach to Tier 1 differentiation will be presented in order to help teachers to:

- Meet the needs of more students
- Identify and extend existing best practice
- Plan curriculum that connects to and extends state standards
- Minimize paperwork, meetings, and assessments
- Identify and employ evidence-based practices, alternative assessments, curriculum-based measurements, and user-friendly technology
- Understand and address issues of implementation fidelity.

WHAT SKILLS WILL THIS HELP ME DEVELOP?

This workshop will focus on skills that will help teachers:

- a. Embrace and use a common language of instruction and assessment
- b. Understand the structure of curriculum and how to teach in ways that advantage students, including gifted learners
- c. Employ levels of thinking effectively
- d. Teach and assess students via multiple modalities
- e. Use instruction to clarify expectations for academics and behavior
- f. Support students' development of self-advocacy and internal locus of control
- g. Tie factual content to "big ideas" (concepts, issues, problems, global themes)
- h. Teach to and through students' strengths
- i. Understand the major legal concepts related to RtI and Special Education: 1. LRE, 2. FAPE, 3. Access
- j. Identify and assist twice-exceptional gifted students

About the Presenter:

Jim Curry has served as a classroom teacher, a program coordinator, an administrator, a consultant, a professor, and a mentor. He continues to work with teachers in classrooms to provide challenging but supportive learning experiences for

students who have diverse backgrounds, abilities/disabilities, and needs. These experiences have provided Jim with the "real-world" base for sharing ideas in workshops and in graduate courses.

Jim and his colleague, John Samara, have written and edited approximately 20 publications that are designed to assist teachers in planning and implementing instructional activities that respond to a wide range of learner needs. Together, they developed the Curry-Samara Model (CSM) for curriculum, instruction, and assessment. The model has been field tested in classrooms, pre-kindergarten through high school. Guidebooks have been developed and published in the states of Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Maine, Michigan, North Carolina, Texas, and Utah.
